## ABOUT THE PROJECT

- Stretches 35 miles between the Mitchell Interchange in Milwaukee, through Racine and Kenosha counties to the Illinois state line.
- The \$1.9 billion project will expand the interstate to four lanes in each direction and redesign 17 interchanges.
- Construction began in 2009 and will be complete in 2020.

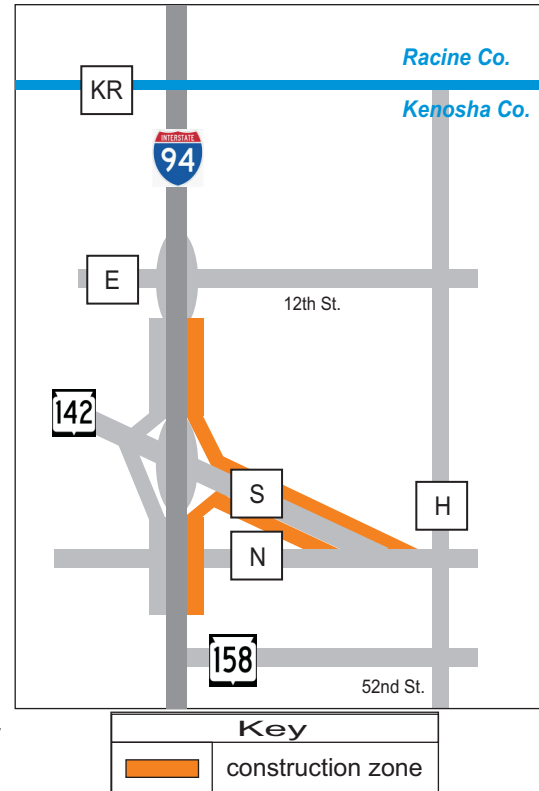


## WIS 142 East Frontage Road & County S Construction Update

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is continuing construction on the I-94 North-South Freeway Project. In Kenosha County in 2011, WisDOT will reconstruct the County S roadway east of I-94 and the WIS 142 East Frontage Road.

The following closures will be in effect:

- *Full closure of the East Frontage Road from County E to WIS 158 from the week of April 18, 2011 - Fall 2011*
- *Full closure of County S east of the I-94 EAST (SB) ramps from the week of April 18, 2011 - late July 2011 (Traffic will be detoured to use County N and WIS 158 to the West Frontage Road.)*
- *Upon completion of County S, full closure of County N east of I-94 EAST (SB) from July/August - late Fall 2011 (Traffic will be detoured to use County S.)*



Available alternate routes during the construction at WIS 142 are the West Frontage Road and County E or WIS 158 interchanges.

Access to local businesses will be maintained throughout the duration of the project. Construction is scheduled to be complete in Fall 2011.
